GURURAJ: ...and what we want, forget it. You can't. You get supplied, not with the standard of what you want, but what you need. And that is the law of nature. You see. When we say, "May you never be in want," this statement is not totally true. I would say, "May all your needs be fulfilled." I want a million pounds now. Hm? No. That's what I want, and it's wrong. But I need to have lunch, and I'm sure it will come from somewhere. [LAUGHTER] Huh. Oh, good. It's been so pleasant being with you here. I've been used to speaking to a group of ten people, right, up to my largest group I spoke to was thirty thousand people. But to me, it could be ten people, twenty people, thirty people, or thirty thousand it just means one thing that the thirty thousand is one and one is one, five is one...see, my math is great. [LAUGHTER] Five is one. Twenty is one. Thirty is one. Because after all, to whom do I pour my heart? Just to the one. The one within me pours itself out to itself. So the one that pours to the one. And we don't count by numbers. Hm? I think we should write a book on this kind of mathematics. It would be good.

VOICE: Math one.

GURURAJ: [LAUGHS] Math one. Ah, beautiful. Oh, Ken. Yes. So, of course, to repeat again it has been so, so enjoyable. Dorothy is not here but please convey this to her...is she there?

VOICES: You mean Bobby.

GURURAJ: Oh, yeah. Bobby and Dorothy and the whole group of people here in Las Vegas have been so, so kind. And I wish to thank you for your hospitality.

Thank you is a word that's never used in the Eastern languages. It is just a kind of empty politeness. Who do you thank when everyone is you? So you thank yourself, do you? No. In the Eastern languages we have two words which are used, and you say, [shukriya?], good deed. If I help someone across the road with their heavy burdens or their parcels, and the lady, the old lady, whoever it is, would say, [shukriya?], good deed. Hm. So what are you doing is fostering the thought in the mind of the person that did this for you, you would say good deed, so that he will keep on doing good deeds. So, to repeat again, there is no thank you in the Eastern languages. The other word is [maherbani?], which means you have been merciful. By saying that you are planting the seed in the person's mind that you have been

merciful, and that person will become more and more merciful. Do you see. So let me say the whole lot: thank you, [shukriya?] and [maherbani?]. [LAUGHS]

[Danyavard?], ah, beautiful. [Danya?] means wealth. [Danyavard?] means be wealthy. Not in the sense of money. It includes all of course, but when you say [danyavard?], may you be wealthy there in the spirit. May your whole life be filled with wealth. And of course that kind of wealth includes your back pocket, includes health, includes that depth there. [Danyavard?]. So I've got a plane to catch, and I've still got the bags to pack and things. And it's been so beautiful being with you. Small course, but very nice. Lovely family togetherness. A lovely feeling, and I pray that He has been merciful for bringing us together. [Marapadhi?], His mercy. Thank you.

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
